



Primary PE and Sport Premium Grant 2021/2022 - evaluation.

At Boarshaw, we recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of all children. We believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and extracurricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all our children. A specialist Sports Coach has been employed to teach PE and Sports across the whole school since 2016, this is not funded through the Sport Premium grant.

As a school we are extremely proactive in trying to raise the quality of and opportunities for sporting activities for all children. Our Primary School Sport's Funding will enable us to continue and extend our provision through employing additional sports professionals, entering into more competitive sports competitions, provide off site opportunities in specialist facilities and training our staff to deliver in-house quality PE sessions. We offer a variety of extra curricular sporting clubs and are developing our playground equipment to provide a range of physical activity before and after school, at break times and lunchtimes.

The Government funding has helped us to improve our core offer and supports us to work towards creating healthier lifestyles and increased participation for all.

2021- 2022 Grant received - £18,503 (+ £12,165 from previous year)

Physical Education is part of the whole school Curriculum, all our children access high quality Physical Education as part of the taught timetable in addition to a range of sports after school. We are also a member of the Middleton Sports Association which enables pupils to participate in a range of competitions and interschool events including cross country, 5 a side football, football, netball and darts.

We promote healthy lifestyles and support children to develop a greater awareness of the dangers of obesity, smoking and other activities which have potential to undermine pupils' health. We have an annual Sports Day Event where our children take part in a range of sporting and competitive events.

Outcomes

All pupils continue to develop their understanding of healthy lifestyles and how to look after themselves. Team games ensure that children work together. School once again participated in a range of interschool sporting competitions including football, netball, cross country, cricket and darts.

During this academic year we attempted to offer a broad and balanced PE curriculum to all pupils, the Covid risk assessment identified the heating in the school hall as an ongoing high risk and as such could not, on the advice of the LA and Public Health England, be used. Lack of heating meant that temperatures in the hall were below the Approved Code of Practice 16 degrees and as such use of the hall was suspended from early December until March.

Year 5 attended Swimming.

Staff shortages impacted on our ability to achieve some of the intended spend eg Hollingworth Lake and some EdStart provision. We were unable to secure a dance teacher.

During the 2021-2022 academic year sports clubs were offered in football, netball, cricket, dodgeball, darts and cross country.
